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## Extract from Child Protection Policy 2021-22

### 6. Online Safety

- It is essential that children are safeguarded from potentially harmful and inappropriate material or behaviours online. ASPIRE will adopt a whole ASPIRE approach to online safety which will empower, protect, and educate our learners and staff in their use of technology, and establish mechanisms to identify, intervene in, and escalate any concerns where appropriate.
- ASPIRE will ensure online safety is reflected as required in all relevant policies. Online safety is considered as a running and interrelated theme when devising and implementing our policies and procedures and when planning our curriculum, staff training, the role and responsibilities of the DSL and parental engagement.
- ASPIRE identifies that the breadth of issues classified within online safety is considerable, but can be categorised into four areas of risk:
  - Content: being exposed to illegal, inappropriate or harmful content. For example pornography, fake news, racism, misogyny, self-harm, suicide, anti-Semitism, radicalisation and extremism.
  - Contact: being subjected to harmful online interaction with other users. For example peer to peer pressure, commercial advertising and adults posing as children or young adults with the intention to groom or exploit them for sexual, criminal, financial or other purposes.
  - Conduct: personal online behaviour that increases the likelihood of, or causes, harm. For example, making, sending and receiving explicit images (e.g. consensual and non-consensual sharing of nudes and semi-nudes and/or pornography), sharing other explicit images and online bullying.
  - Commerce: risks such as online gambling, inappropriate advertising, phishing and or financial scams.
- ASPIRE recognises that technology, and the risks and harms related to it, evolve and change rapidly. The ASPIRE will carry out an annual review of our approaches to online safety, supported by an annual risk assessment which considers and reflects the risks our children face.
- The headteacher/principle will be informed of online safety concerns by the DSL, as appropriate. The named governor for safeguarding will report on online safety practice and incidents, including outcomes, on a regular basis to the wider governing body. Amend as appropriate.

#### 6.1 Policies and Procedures

- The DSL has overall responsibility for online safety within the ASPIRE but will liaise with other members of staff, for example IT technicians, curriculum leads etc. as necessary.
- The DSL will respond to online safety concerns reported in line with our child protection and other associated policies, including our anti-bullying, social media and behaviour policies. ●
  - Internal sanctions and/or support will be implemented as appropriate. ○ Where necessary, concerns will be escalated and reported to relevant partner agencies in line with local policies and procedures.
- ASPIRE uses a wide range of technology. This includes computers, laptops, tablets and other digital devices, the internet, our learning platform, intranet and email systems. ○ All ASPIRE owned devices and systems will be used in accordance with our acceptable use policies and with appropriate safety and security measures in place.

- **ASPIRE** recognises the specific risks that can be posed by mobile and smart technology, including mobile/smart phones, cameras and wearable technology. In accordance with **KCSIE 2021 and EYFS 2021** **ASPIRE** has appropriate mobile and smart technology and image use policies in place, which are shared and understood by all members of the community.

## 6.2 Appropriate Filtering and Monitoring

- **ASPIRE** will do all we reasonably can to limit children's exposure to online risks through **ASPIRE** provided IT systems and will ensure that appropriate filtering and monitoring systems are in place.

### **Cantinum provide the wifi which is appropriately filtered**

If learners or staff discover unsuitable sites or material, they are required to: **turn off monitor/screen, report the concern immediately to a member of staff, report the URL of the site to technical staff/services.**

- All users will be informed that use of our systems can be monitored, and that monitoring will be in line with data protection, human rights, and privacy legislation.
  - **Filtering breaches or concerns identified through our monitoring approaches will be recorded and reported to the DSL who will respond as appropriate.**
  - Any access to material believed to be illegal will be reported immediately to the appropriate agencies, such as the [Internet Watch Foundation](#) and the police.
  - When implementing appropriate filtering and monitoring, **ASPIRE** will ensure that “over blocking” does not lead to unreasonable restrictions as to what children can be taught with regards to online teaching and safeguarding.
- **ASPIRE** acknowledges that whilst filtering and monitoring is an important part of **ASPIRE** online safety responsibilities, it is only one part of our approach to online safety.
    - Learners will use appropriate search tools, apps and online resources as identified following an informed risk assessment.
    - Learners internet use will be supervised by staff according to their age and ability.
    - Learners will be directed to use age appropriate online resources and tools by staff.

## 6.3 Information Security and Access Management

- **ASPIRE** is responsible for ensuring an appropriate level of security protection procedures are in place, in order to safeguard our systems as well as staff and learners.
- **ASPIRE** will review the effectiveness of these procedures periodically to keep up with evolving cyber-crime technologies.

## 6.4 Staff Training

- **ASPIRE** will ensure that all staff receive online safety training as part of induction and that ongoing online safety training and update for all staff will be integrated, aligned and considered as part of our overarching safeguarding approach.

## 6.5 Educating Learners

- **ASPIRE** will ensure a comprehensive whole **ASPIRE** curriculum response is in place to enable all learners to learn about and manage online risks effectively as part of providing a broad and balanced curriculum.

## 6.6 Working with Parents/Carers

- **ASPIRE** will build a partnership approach to online safety and will support parents/carers to become aware and alert of the potential online benefits and risks for children by:
  - **providing information on our ASPIRE website and through existing communication channels (such as official social media, newsletters etc.), offering specific online safety events for parents/carers or highlighting online safety at existing events.**

## 6.7 Remote Learning

- **ASPIRE** will ensure any remote sharing of information, communication and use of online learning tools and systems will be in line with privacy and data protection requirements.
- All communication with learners and parents/carers will take place using **ASPIRE** provided or approved communication channels; for example, **ASPIRE** provided email accounts and phone numbers or agreed systems e.g. [Google Classroom](#)
  - Any pre-existing relationships or situations which mean this cannot be complied with will be discussed with the DSL.
- Staff and learners will engage with remote teaching and learning in line with existing behaviour principles as set out in our [ASPIRE behaviour policy/code of conduct](#) and [Acceptable Use Policies](#).
- Staff and learners will be encouraged to report issues experienced at home and concerns will be responded to in line with our child protection and other relevant policies.
- When delivering remote learning, staff will follow our Remote Learning Acceptable Use Policy (AUP) Parents/carers will be made aware of what their children are being asked to do online, including the sites they will be asked to access. **ASPIRE** will continue to be clear who from the **ASPIRE** their child is going to be interacting with online.
- Parents/carers will be encouraged to ensure children are appropriately supervised online and that appropriate parent controls are implemented at home.
